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# D) ADOPTION OF MEETING AGENDA

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It was **MOVED** by **Councilmember Kraus** and **SECONDED** by **Councilmember Canning** to approve the Council Meeting Agenda. The Motion was carried unanimously. (*Mayor Gingles was absent*)

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# E) **PUBLIC HEARING** (7:33 p.m.)

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1) Public hearing on the draft City of Calistoga Fiscal Year 2012/2013 Budget.

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City Manager Spitler introduced the item. He stated that the Public Hearing is regarding the proposed FY 2012/13 budget. He stated that the city has struggled over these past three years with financial problems as a result of the recession. He said that leading into the beginning of FY 2011/12 budget the Council had to take several actions to get the financial situation under control and that over the last two years they have eliminated 14 city staff positions, reduced city salaries by 12%-15% including higher contributions to healthcare, reduced overall budget expenditures in all categories, implemented the PERS reform and adopted new formulas for new employees and required all employees to pay their employee contribution towards PERS, and settled numerous lawsuits and claims to the city's financial benefit. He stated that the result has been that the depletion of the General Fund reserves has stopped and is starting to replenish. He said that staff has worked hard to manage their budgets. He stated that a lot of time has spent on processing development permits for projects such as Silver Rose and Enchanted Resorts. He stated the budget presented before Council does not include any new development revenue, there are no proposed staff layoffs in. and that salaries are frozen. He stated that the Council held a budget workshop on May 24, 2012 to review the draft budget and gave direction to staff. He said that the proposed budget is designed to maintain the existing level of service and reliability of our infrastructure at present levels, however, there are many facilities that are not receiving maintenance and repair and replacement as they should. He stated that new development is crucial in order to fill the gap that exists.

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 Administrative Services Director Leon provided an overview of the City's cash flow situation and briefly reviewed the City's proposed Fiscal Year 2011/2012 budget. Ms. Leon gave a PowerPoint presentation discussing the budget summary and proposed budget changes for the following funds: Water, Wastewater, Capital Improvement funds for Water and Wastewater, Equipment Replacement, and Special Revenue.

**Councilmember Canning** stated that if there is any public comment or discussion regarding economic vitality he will need to recuse himself from that conversation. He requested that this discussion take place prior to other public comment.

**Councilmember Canning** recused himself at 7:51 p.m.

Vice Mayor Dunsford opened the public hearing at 7:51 p.m.

**Ann Scott**, **4281 Scott Way**, asked whether the Council has looked at any organizations other than the Chamber of Commerce to fulfill the needs of the community. Ms. Scott asked whether the City has considered fining property owners who have vacant storefronts along Lincoln Avenue.

**Michael Quast, 1300 Washington St.,** stated that he has been running the Roman Spa for over 30 years in Calistoga. He spoke regarding the Roman Spa's relationship with the Chamber of Commerce and asked the Council to continue to provide funding for the Visitor Center.

**Dennis McNay, Calistoga,** asked for clarification regarding what the other sources of revenue are that are presented in the budget as two-million plus. Ms. Leon responded. He stated that if the City wants to increase TOT, they should focus on the illegal short-term rentals.

City Manager Spitler discussed the recommendation to reduce the amount given to economic vitality.

Council discussion ensued.

**Councilmember Canning** returned to the dais at 8:08 p.m.

Clarence Luvisi, Rosedale Road, spoke regarding agenda packet consistency. He requested clarification on the following: employee salaries and contract services, Public Works debt service and budget fund transfers.

Vice Mayor Dunsford closed the public hearing at 8:19 p.m.

Council discussion ensued regarding the proposed budget.

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136 137 City Manager Spitler stated that if the City does not have significant income 138 streams in terms of revenue, then the Council will need to figure out how to reinvent our City government so that we can live within our means. He feels 139 that the City has done a good job at stopping the downward trend and is 140 141 pulling out of it, but we still have a long way to go. 142 143 Vice Mayor Dunsford encouraged the community to approach the City 144 Councilmembers if they have questions and/or concerns. He stressed the importance of truthful information and facts being presented. He stated that he reviewed taxicab rates from other surrounding Cities and he gave the results. Mr. Mills discussed the requirements that are applied to the vehicles for hire service in Calistoga.
