SUBJECT: Continued Declaration of Local Emergency at the Dunaweal

Wastewater Treatment Plant Wet Pit Effluent Pumps

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt a resolution that continues the declaration of a local emergency due to the failed effluent pumps at the Dunaweal Wastewater Treatment Plant.

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BACKGROUND: The two main treated effluent/recycled water pumps have failed and it is not economically practical to have them rebuilt. These pumps are critical in our ability to handle peak winter flows at the wastewater treatment plant and without expeditious replacement the plant is subject to hydraulic overloading and possible release of partially treated wastewater to the Napa River.

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At the September 2, 2014 City Council meeting the City Council adopted Resolution 2014-73 which included findings that there is a local emergency pursuant to Sections 20168 and 22050 of the Public Contract Code and emergency provisions in Chapter 3.34 of the Municipal Code, and authorized staff to negotiate purchase orders for the purchase and installation of new Xylem/Flygt effluent pumps, modifications to the sewer utility wet pit, and

17 appurtenant changes to the electrical motor control center.

DISCUSSION: The recommended resolution continues the declaration of a local emergency and staff recommends that the Council adopt a resolution declaring that the failed effluent pumps at the Dunaweal Wastewater Treatment Plant is a continuing local emergency. purchase of the replacement pumps, and demolition and replacement of the failed equipment.

Manufacturing of the control panel continues to be challenging due to the holidays and was finally delivered to the plant on December 29, 2014. The contractor will be installing the panel the week of December 29th and the electrical contractor making the pump electrical connections immediately thereafter. We remain optimistic that completion of panel and pump start-up will happen by mid-January.

We were able to discharge treated effluent (tertiary and secondary) during the past rain events in compliance with our permit dilution ratios using a rented portable pump. This action allowed us to regain significant effluent storage capacity and operate the plant without bypass discharges - which we were forced to do last January. As indicated at the September 2, 2014 Council meeting, this will be a recurring Council action item until new pumps are put into service.

ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS: The corrective pump replacement and sewer utility wet pit modifications are exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, pursuant to Section 15269 (b and c) of Title 14, the California Code of Regulations because the repairs are necessary to prevent or mitigate the state of emergency that currently exists, and to repair publicly owned sewer facilities to maintain services that are essential to public health, safety and property.

<u>CONSISTENCY WITH CITY COUNCIL GOALS AND OBJECTIVES</u>: This project is consistent with Goal No. 3, Establish, improve and maintain City infrastructure; and Objective No. 1, maintain the high level of service and reliability of the City's infrastructure systems and facilities.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no fiscal impact associated with adoption of the recommended Resolution. All costs associated with the actual repairs are budgeted for in the FY 2014-15 CIP budget under project 13-5493, Effluent disposal improvements.

ALTERNATIVES: The City Council could opt not to declare a continued local state of emergency and direct staff to prepare plans and specifications and bid the pump replacement, installation and wet pit modifications. Under this alternative the wet pit and pumping capacity would not be corrected before this winter creating the potential for the WWTP to become hydraulically overloaded and release of partially treated wastewater into the Napa River. Staff would either rent or purchase temporary portable pumps to minimize this potential as best as possible.
