ISSUE: Request for direction to the City Manager to negotiate a professional services agreement for Animal Control Services to include field and shelter services for the City of Calistoga.

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RECOMMENDATION: By motion, direct the City Manager to negotiate a professional services agreement for Animal Control Services to include field and shelter services for the City of Calistoga.

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BACKGROUND: On March 3, 2015 the City Manager presented to the City Council the status of animal control services within the City with the recommendation that the Council direct him to enter into negotiations with the County of Napa to provide field and shelter services. A potential contract would be in the form of a multi-year professional services agreement.

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Previously to this, the City Manager attempted to negotiate such as contract with Wine Country Animal Lovers, Inc. (WCAL) to provide these services. WCAL intended to use Petaluma Animal Services Foundation (PASF) for field services and the Pet Clinic (Dr. Franquelin) for shelter services. Due to lack of zoning permits to allow an animal shelter at the Calistoga Pet Clinic, staff could not recommend a contract with WCAL.

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At the March 3rd meeting WCAL asked the City Council for a 30 day time extension before making a decision to address the lack of a viable animal shelter in their proposal. Since the March 3rd meeting staff has been in contact with the various entities and received proposals for field and shelter services, as follows: County of Napa (Sheriff's Office and Napa Animal Shelter) and from the Petaluma Animal Control Services (PASF), a 501c(3) non-profit organization (see Attachment 2). There is no proposal or subcontract arrangement that includes services from WCAL or the Calistoga Pet Clinic (or Dr. Franquelin) in either of the two proposals.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>: It should be noted that animal control services is usually provided in two major functions:

1) field services which provides service to animals found in public areas such as lost, injured or sick animals with transport to the owners or to an animal shelter; and

2) shelter services which receives these animals either from the field personnel or by the public directly and provides initial medical treatment, holding up to 6 to 10 days, re-uniting with the pet owner, adoptions and euthanasia, when necessary.

In all cases the Napa County Sheriff's Office has the responsibility to address animal bites and rabies situations within the City.

 A review of the proposals indicates, to staff's satisfaction, that both entities can provide professional animal control services consistent with the Calistoga Municipal Code requirements and accepted practice. Staff has checked references and has visited both animal shelters. Both received positive recommendations. A detailed breakdown of services offered by each entity broken down by field and shelter services is shown in Attachment 1.

There has been a lot of conversation in the local newspaper and the internet about the relative "kill" or "no kill" policies of each animal shelter. Staff believes that this term is inflammatory and non-productive. The accepted terminology and standard unit of measure in animal welfare is the "live release rate". The Napa Shelter has a live release rate of 94% for dogs and 66% for cats. PASF has a live release rate for both dogs and cats of 99.3%.

Each shelter is operated to promote adoption as the best option, aside from returning the pet to its rightful owner. Both shelters also undertake euthanasia as a last resort to address severe and painful medical conditions that cannot be cured as well as extreme behavioral problems. Relative emphasis on adoption versus euthanasia is debatable, but it is clear the both shelters are operated within accepted practices in terms of legal requirements and compassionate care of animals. Each shelter has a caring staff, active use of volunteers and a clear emphasis on adoption of pets.

From staff's perspective there are two additional subjects that should be addressed: shelter location and cost of service.

Shelter Locations:

Napa: The Napa County shelter is located at 942 Hartle Court in the city of Napa. It is located off Imola Avenue next to the Century Movie Theatres. A Google Map search indicates under ideal driving conditions it is 28.4 Miles from Calistoga about 40 minutes of driving time.

Petaluma: The PASF shelter is located at 840 Hopper Street, Petaluma, at the Public Works Corporation Yard in the city of Petaluma. It is located off Lakeville Street next to Hwy 101. A Google Map search indicates under ideal driving conditions it is 34 Miles from Calistoga about 46 minutes of driving time.

It is clear that the Napa shelter has closer and easier access for Calistogans. The Petaluma shelter, besides being further away, is located in an area that is hard to find. It is logical for someone trying to retrieve their pet that an animal shelter for Calistoga should be located in Napa County, rather than Petaluma.

Cost of Service Provision:

In obtaining professional services the primary objective is to find the entity that can provide excellent service in a timely manner. Monetary cost is also an important: the City of Calistoga has a responsibility to carefully consider the fiscal impact of any decision for service. The following is the cost of service that was included in the respective proposals:

Field Services

Napa County Sheriff's office would provide animal control services for a cost of \$20,493.00 per year. This would be on a one year basis, at the end of the first year the costs will be reevaluated and then a multi-year contract fixed price can be determined (the Sheriff has no recent information on the demand for services so it is difficult to determine annual cost).

PASF would provide animal control services for a fixed cost of \$15,400 per year (for the first three years).

Shelter Services

Napa County Animal Shelter would charge Calistoga based upon a countywide formula which is population based, taking into consideration the net between revenues versus costs (the revenues from fees for services would be included in the revenue). They also have an annual surcharge to create a capital reserve for

future capital expense for the shelter. This would be 2% the first year, 2.5% the second year and 3% the third year and all subsequent years of the agreement. There is also a phase-in of the annual cost over three years. Accordingly, the first year cost is \$12,523; second year: \$24,514; and third year: \$36,540. This is a total cost of \$73,577 over the first three years of service.

PASF would annually charge Calistoga \$34,000 (for the first three years), plus they would retain any fees or charges. This is a total cost of \$102,000 over the first three years of service.

Combined Field and Shelter Service Costs

The combined field and shelter services by Napa County would be \$33,016 the first year, \$45,007 the second year and \$57,033 the third year. This is a total cost of \$135,056 over the first three years of service.

PASF combined field and shelter services would be \$49,400 annually. This is a total cost of \$148,200 over the first three years of service.

Conclusion:

As stated previously from staff's perspective, both entities are highly qualified to undertake animal control services in Calistoga. Having Napa County undertake field and shelter services would be logical as the Police Department works closely with the Sherriff's office and the Napa Shelter provides easier access for local residents. In the three year perspective the Napa County proposal is \$13,144 less expensive (assuming the Sheriff's field service expense stays at the same rate). At the third year and beyond (under current assumptions) PASF would become the least cost alternative.

Staff seeks City Council direction to negotiate a Professional Services Agreement with one of these entities for animal control and shelter Services. If negotiations are successful, two agreements would be brought back to the City Council for final approval.

FISCAL IMPACT: This year's budget did allocate \$35,000 in the Police Department budget for animal control and shelter services. It is likely the total cost for a shelter and animal control services will be around \$50,000 to \$60,000 per year.
