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<u>ISSUE</u>: Consideration of a Resolution authorizing the submittal of an application to the California Energy Commission's Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant program for \$28,114 to fund Lighting Retrofits in City Facilities and appropriation of said funds during the 2009/10 budget year.

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RECOMMENDATION: Adopt the Resolution.

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BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: The City of Calistoga has applied, and is eligible for a small cities Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant in the amount of \$28,114 funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) for appropriate energy conservation projects. This amount is determined by the City's population. The ARRA provided energy efficiency grants to local governments. Larger cities and counties received direct allocations from the federal government, while smaller cities and counties are required to access these funds through the California Energy Commission (CEC). These grants must meet certain efficiency performance criteria. Awards may not exceed one dollar (\$1) per kilowatt hour of electricity saved annually, nor ten dollars (\$10) for each therm of natural gas saved. This level of compensation itself is generally insufficient to fully fund a major project. Under these energy efficiency grant criteria, only approximately 10 to 20 percent of a solar photovoltaic or geothermal renewable energy project could be funded.

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Staff is not trained in performing the analysis of calculating and documenting the energy efficiency of complex energy projects. However, the CEC's grant criteria allow for a direct purchase option on certain specific project types. Staff evaluated the CEC's direct purchase options and believes that the most viable project is the replacement of fluorescent T-12 lighting fixtures in City facilities with more energy efficient T-8 lighting fixtures. This direct purchase option would not require that the City conduct a thorough analysis of the energy savings to meet

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the grant's energy efficiency criteria. City facilities affected would include: City Hall, the Police Station, Public Works Facilities, Monhoff Recreation Facility, and the Community Center.

While this EECBG grant funding is not completely assured, the probability of grant approval from the CEC is good. The CEC requires a standard model Resolution from all local agency claimants for this grant. Such a model Resolution is provided here for adoption.

Due to staff workload and the grant application deadline of January 15, 2010, the grant application was submitted in advance of formal approval by Council. With Council approval, the attached authorizing Resolution will be forwarded for inclusion with the grant application package.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW: This work is categorically exempt under Section 15301 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines as it involves the minor alteration of an existing public facility with no expansion of its existing use. It was also determined that the project is categorically excluded from the federal National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) because the work involves energy efficiency retrofits to local jurisdiction facilities and does not involve "extraordinary circumstances" as defined by 10 CFR Section 1021.410.

FISCAL IMPACT: While it is yet unclear how many T-12 fluorescent lighting fixtures can be replaced within available funding, if 100 fixtures are replaced with T-8 fixtures, staff roughly estimates an annual electrical energy savings of roughly \$2,000 to \$3,000.

The Fiscal Year 2008-2010 General Fund Capital Improvement Program – Green Initiatives Account (No. 4608) did not anticipate this program funding. As such, this budget adjustment seeks to increase the program funding and appropriations to account for this EECBG grant by \$28,114 if the grant funding is approved by the CEC. The EECBG grant program does not require any matching funds for these projects.

Staff recommends City Council authorize the City Manager to accept the funding (upon grant approval) and approve the budget adjustment to recognize the additional revenue and the corresponding expenditure for this project during FY 2009/10.

WHEREAS, the City of Calistoga recognizes that it is in the interest of the regional, state, and national economy to stimulate the economy, create and retain jobs; reduce fossil fuel emissions; and reduce total energy usage and improve energy efficiency within our jurisdiction; and WHEREAS, Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) funds are available through the California Energy Commission's EECBG Program for grants to eligible local governments for cost-effective energy efficiency projects; and WHEREAS, the City of Calistoga is eligible for EECBG funding under the California Energy Commission's EECBG Program; and WHEREAS, the City of Calistoga is proposing to implement the energy efficiency project described in Exhibit A in order to qualify for EECBG funds from the California Energy Commission; and WHEREAS, the City of Calistoga has considered the application of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) to the approval of the energy efficiency project described in Exhibit A; and NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that in compliance with the CEQA, the City of Calistoga finds that the approval of the energy efficiency project described in Exhibit A is a "project" under CEQA that is exempt under Section 15301 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines as it involves the minor alteration of an existing public facility with no expansion of its existing use; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council authorizes the submittal of the application to the California Energy Commission's EECBG Program for funds to execute the proposed project described in Exhibit A; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, if recommended for funding by the California Energy Commission, the City Council authorizes City of Calistoga to accept a grant award up to the amount of this application for \$28,114, and, that the City Manager, acting for the City Council is hereby authorized and empowered to execute in the name of the City of Calistoga, all necessary contracts and agreements, and amendments hereto, to implement and carry out the purposes specified in the application; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City of Calistoga, City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager or his designee to accept and appropriate a grant for EECBG funding in an amount up to \$28,114 to the Green Initiatives Fund 4608.
