SUBJECT: WATER EFFICIENT LANDSCAPE ORDINANCE

REQUEST:

Presentation by staff on the State Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance.

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND:

In 1990, the State Legislature passed Assembly Bill 325, Water Conservation in Landscaping Act, requiring the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to adopt standards for efficient water use in landscaping. In compliance with this requirement, DWR adopted the State Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO) in 1993 establishing specific methods for local agencies to implement in landscape and irrigation design to protect limited water resources. Local agencies were given the authority under this bill to either accept the State Model Ordinance or to adopt their own local standards. Failure to take one of these actions meant the State Model Ordinance became the standard for local agencies.

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Since the City of Calistoga did not adopt its own local ordinance in 1993, the State Model Ordinance was adopted by default. However, the State Model Ordinance has had relatively little impact on Calistoga since 1993, in large part because of the high threshold for landscaped area (2,500 sq. ft. or more of new or replanted landscape) and because of the many exemptions in the State Model Ordinance (homeowner-installed residential landscapes).

Recently adopted legislation (AB 2717 and AB 1881) amended the State Model Ordinance and became effective on January 1, 2010. Similar to the 1993 process, local agencies can either adopt their own standards or adopt the revised State Model Ordinance; doing nothing will result in defaulting to the State Model Ordinance.

STATE MODEL WATER EFFICIENT LANDSCAPE ORDINANCE

The purpose of the MWELO is to:

- Establish a structure for designing, installing, maintaining and managing water efficient landscapes in new and rehabilitated projects;
- · Reduce water use to the lowest practical point;
- Establish provisions for water management practices and water waste prevention for established landscapes; and
- Promote the values and benefits of landscape while recognizing the need to use water and other resources efficiently.

Landscapes that require a building or landscape permit, plan check or design review are:

- New construction and rehabilitated landscapes for public agency projects and private development projects with a landscape area equal to or greater than 2,500 square feet;
- New construction and rehabilitated landscapes which are developerinstalled in single-family and multi-family projects with a landscape area equal to or greater than 2,500 square feet; or
- New construction landscapes which are homeowner-provided and/or homeowner-hired in single-family and multi-family residential projects with a total project landscape area equal to or greater than 5,000 square feet.

Landscapes that are exempt include the following:

· Registered local, state or federal historical sites;

Ecological restoration projects that do not require a permanent irrigation system;
Mined-land reclamation projects that do not require a permanent irrigation

Plant collections, as part of botanical gardens and arboretums open to the public.

DEVELOPMENT OF A LOCAL ORDINANCE:

In response to Assembly Bill 1881 requirements, the City of Calistoga is developing a local ordinance that is at least as effective in conserving water as the updated MWELO prepared by DWR. The City ordinance proposes to use the same applicability thresholds as the MWELO, but will provide several landscape and irrigation guidelines derived from a collaborative effort of stakeholders in the North Bay (Sonoma, Marin, and Napa counties).

The City of Calistoga anticipates adoption of its local Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance in the spring, in advance of a related green building ordinance. City

staff has notified the DWR that the City's landscape laws are being proposed for amendment and the State's Model Landscape Ordinance will be in effect from January 1, 2010, until such time as the City Council adopts a revised landscape ordinance modifying those laws.
