URBAN DESIGN PLAN (UDP) DRAFT IMPLEMENTATION

WORK PROGRAM

REQUEST

Consideration of a Work Program, including proposed timelines, for incorporating UDP ideas and suggestions into the General Plan, Zoning Ordinance and other regulatory documents, as well as, public initiated improvement projects as identified in the UDP and adopted on January 19, 2010.

BACKGROUND

On January 19, 2010, the City Council adopted the Urban Design Plan. The UDP is intended to insure that the character of Calistoga is retained and in fact enhanced through the maintenance and improvement of private and public properties and the refinement of land use policies and regulations. Upon its adoption, the UDP would be utilized to guide efforts to amend the General Plan and Calistoga Municipal Code to better articulate the expectations of the community for future development and by doing so would assist property owners to understand the goals and desired elements of land development.

However, as noted throughout the public hearing process, the UDP by itself has no legal land use authority and is not a replacement of the General Plan nor does it supersede or otherwise replace the General Plan or Calistoga Municipal Code land use designations, policies or regulations. Instead, it presents suggestions for refinement and amendment to these policy and regulatory documents.

Therefore, staff reported to the City Council that immediately after adoption staff would commence work on developing an implementation program setting forth a recommended schedule for incorporating ideas and suggestions into the General Plan, Zoning Ordinance and other regulatory documents, as well as, public initiated improvement projects as identified in the UDP. Staff also informed the

City Council that this draft implementation program would be presented to the Planning Commission for public input and review and recommendation to the City Council.

DISCUSSION

Since adoption of the UDP, staff has incorporated final direction of the City Council, placed photos back, updated maps, and completed final editing of the document. Attached for the Commission's review is the final UDP as adopted by the City Council on January 19, 2010. (Refer to Attachment 2)

As adopted, UDP focuses on six character areas which will, in the future, play an integral role in the quality of life and economic vitality of Calistoga. The UDP also addresses circulatory infrastructure needs in support of these objectives. Through a refined set of development objectives from those broadly established in the General Plan for key areas, the intent is to provide greater clarity and certainty and direction for change and improvement over time. Implementation of the UDP regarding the nature of new development and redevelopment in key areas of Calistoga will establish enhanced public understanding and acceptance and will facilitate private and public investment.

Overview of Recommended Work Program

Attachment 1 represents the recommended draft implementation work program that includes a listing of ideas and suggestions outlined in the UDP within the Character Areas and/or Circulation System Chapters for inclusion into the General Plan and Zoning Ordinance. It should be noted that these amendments will take different forms. Some may simply be additional language added to elements of the current General Plan, such as new goals or objectives or policies. Other actions will include modification of the General Plan Land Use Map to reflect modification of boundaries or other map amendments to implement ideas and suggestions as needed. Still, other actions will include the development of new land use designations (as suggested by the Character Areas of the UDP) and the requisite accompanying land use descriptions, goals, objectives, and policies. With regards to potential Zoning amendments, actions would include changes to zoning district designations and regulations to implement adopted General Plan policy direction. As previously discussed at UDP public hearings, these amendments will come forward to the Planning Commission for discussion and recommendation and then be forwarded to the City Council for final action. It should also be noted that specific environmental review and noticed public hearings will also be a part of this process.

Also included in Attachment 1 is a list of ideas and suggestions for public improvement projects to be initiated and completed over time, as directed by the City Council and when funding becomes available.

Overview of Priority Classification

As presented, staff is recommending that the action steps be prioritized into three priority groups – Priority A, Priority B, and Priority C. Priority A action steps are proposed to be completed with Fiscal Year 2010-2011 and would be completed by City staff, thereby will not require additional funding for consultant services or preparation of special studies.

Priority B action steps are proposed to be completed within Fiscal Year 2011-2012 and Fiscal Year 2012-2013. It should be noted that these action steps would also be processed by staff but may involve the need for consultant services for the preparation of special or technical studies. Therefore, additional time would be needed to apply for grants and other funding sources for these services prior to commencing work on each action step. It should be further noted that seeking funding sources could commence within Fiscal Year 2010-2011.

Priority C action steps have been identified to be scheduled for a future fiscal year pending identification of staffing and/or the need for consultant services for the preparation of special or technical studies.

Given these priority groups, staff is recommending the following six action steps be completed by the end of Fiscal Year 2010-2011.

- Process General Plan Map & Text Amendments to the Land Use Element, Community Identity & Circulation Elements to integrate adopted UDP ideas and suggestions and/or map changes
- Process Zoning Ordinance Text & Map Amendments to integrate adopted UDP ideas and suggestions and/or map changes
- Conduct a study to evaluate all feasible alternatives including signalization, intersection realignment, a roundabout and other alternatives to address deficiencies and objectives at the State Highway 29/Silverado Trail Intersection. [This action has been designated as City Council Key Priority Project #8 for FY 2009-2010]
- Conduct a study to evaluate all feasible alternatives including signalization, intersection realignment, a roundabout and other alternatives to address deficiencies and objectives at the State Highway 128/Petrified Forest Road Intersection. [This action has been designated as City Council Key Priority Project #8 for FY 2009-10]

- 120 Establish a pedestrian cross walk on State Highway 29 at Pine 121 Street.
 - Update the City's Parking requirements.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

It has been determined that the proposed action is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(b)(3) which states that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. It can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the action being contemplated, recommendation on a work program to the City Council, will have any impact on the environment.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Planning Commission discuss, solicit public comment, and provide a recommendation to the City Council on draft implementation work program proposed for the adopted Urban Design Plan.

SUGGESTED MOTION

I move that the Planning Commission recommend to the City Council adoption of the draft implementation work program proposed for the adopted Urban Design Plan, as recommended by staff.


