**SUBJECT:** Safely Surrendered Baby law

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**REQUEST:** Consideration of a Resolution to adopt the "Safely Surrendered Baby Program".

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**RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt Resolution.

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BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: The Safely Surrendered Baby Law (also known as the Safe Haven Law or Newborn Abandonment Law) was signed into law by Governor Davis in September 2000 and on January 1, 2001, SB 1368 went into effect. The purpose of the law is to protect babies from being hurt or killed because they were abandoned. The law allows a parent or legal guardian to confidentially surrender an infant, three days old or younger, to any hospital emergency department or other designated Safe Surrender sites. As long as the baby has not been abused or neglected, the person may surrender the baby without fear of arrest or prosecution for the child abandonment.

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Amending the Law – SB139:

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On August 1, 2003, the State legislative enacted SB 139 to strengthen the existing Safely Surrendered Baby Law. This legislation included giving the authority to designate public facilities as Safe Surrender sites to the County Board of Supervisors. In addition, fire stations were determined to be appropriate Safe Surrender locations.

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### Training:

### RESOLUTION NO. 2008-

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF CALISTOGA CITY COUNCIL TO ESTABLISH A SAFELY SURRENDERED BABY PROGRAM AND APPROVE THE DESIGNATION OF CALISTOGA FIRE STATION NO. 1, LOCATED AT 1113 WASHINGTON STREET AS AN APPROPRIATE SAFE SURRENDER LOCATION

WHEREAS, in January 01, 2001, SB 1368 known as the "Safely Surrendered Baby Law" was signed into law in an effort to protect babies from being hurt or killed due to abandonment, and

WHEREAS, the law allows a parent or legal guardian to confidentially surrender an infant, three days old or younger to any hospital emergency department or other designated safe surrender site without fear of arrest or prosecution for the child abandonment; as long as the baby has not been abused or neglected; and

WHEREAS, on August 1, 2003 legislation was enacted under SB 139 in the State of California to include giving the authority to designate public facilities including Fire Stations within the communities to be appropriate safe surrender sites; and

**WHEREAS**, in an effort with Napa County Health and Human Services the Napa County Board of Supervisors has designated all fire stations within Napa County as safe sites, and

WHEREAS, the City Council, pursuant to SB 1368 and SB 139 has made the following findings for consideration of designating Fire Station No. 1 as an appropriate safe surrender site:

1. That the Napa County Child Services, Napa City Fire Department, American Canyon Fire Department, Napa County Fire Department/ Cal Fire, St. Helena Fire Department and Calistoga Fire Department are working closely together to train our firefighters on how to deal with a surrendered baby situation.

 2. On March 25, 2008 training was provided to the Calistoga Fire Department staff in preparation for a potential baby surrender event and safe surrender information packets were provided for use during such a surrender event.

3. In the event that the City determines the site as suitable as a safe surrender location the site shall physically be marked with the appropriate decal/insignia to identify Fire Station No. 1 as a safe surrender location.

# Calistoga Fire Department Standard Operating Guideline (S.O.G.) Safe Surrender Program

## Introduction

The California Safely Surrendered Baby Law, as amended, allows a person to surrender a minor child (72 hours old or younger) to any firefighter on duty at our station. Under certain circumstances, they may do so discreetly without fear of being prosecuted for child abandonment.

# **Procedure**

Department members will take the following steps when a parent of other person voluntarily surrenders an infant (72 hours old or younger).

- 1. Welcome the parent or other surrendering person. Make a good faith effort to not judge or make comments about why the parent or other person is surrendering the infant. Treat the parent or person with respect and dignity. This is an emotional and difficult time for the person. The parent or surrendering person is not required to give any identity information to personnel taking custody.
- 2. Ascertain that the infant is under 72 hours of age. Accept the infant, even if it appears older than 72 hours.
- 3. Accept the infant and immediately assess the physical condition of the infant and provide appropriate medical care. Once the infant has been voluntarily surrendered, permission to treat and transport is not required from the surrendering parent or other person.
- 4. Notify Emergency Communications Center to dispatch an ambulance to your location Code 2 or 3 depending on the medical condition of the infant.

- 5. Locate and open the Newborn Safe Surrender Kit. Hand the surrendering person the inner business reply mail envelope containing the Newborn Family Medical History questionnaire, a fact sheet and copy of coded, confidential bracelet. Place the smaller coded, confidential bracelet on the infant's wrist and ankle. Record the bracelet number on an Emergency Run Report (ERR).
- 6. Paramedics shall accompany the infant to the receiving hospital and transfer custody to designated hospital employee.
- 7. Notify Napa County Child Protective services (253-4261) as soon as possible but in no case later than 48 hours from the time of taking custody.
