2 **ISSUE:** Follow-up discussion regarding the unsightly condition of garbage

- 3 dumpsters at the public parking lot behind the Fire Station.
- 4 **RECOMMENDATION**: Discuss and provide direction.
- 5 BACKGROUND: Mayor Gingles raised the persistent unsightly condition of
- 6 garbage dumpsters at the public parking lot behind the Fire Station during the recent
- 7 May 4th City Council meeting and requested that a report regarding this use and
- 8 potential options for improvement be presented to the Council.
- 9 Staff has done some initial investigation and developed a few suggestions to
- improve the condition.
- 11 The City owns and maintains a public parking lot behind the Fire Station adjacent to
- 12 the Napa River. Over the years, private trash dumpsters, grease collection bins,
- soiled linen collection boxes, floor mat drying racks gates fences and other private
- 14 improvements have been placed on City property along the Napa riverbank.
- Presently eight private garbage dumpsters and two linen collection bins are present
- at this location. Five of these dumpsters are located on concrete slabs with curbs;
- the other three are simply on the asphalt. Some have chain link fencing with a few wood slats (most of the slats and fencing have fallen into disrepair and are an
- 19 eyesore). Because of the unsightly dump image of this area, it has been used as a
- dumping ground for old couches, appliances and other hard-to-dispose items. Staff
- 21 has also encountered others who feel this is an appropriate location to perform work
- 22 on cars.
- 23 To staff's knowledge, the City has not given formal property use permission to
- 24 businesses that maintain their trash dumpsters in this area. No leases or
- 25 encroachment permits exist and no payments to the City or maintenance
- agreements are in place. Liability coverage is not known. At this time, staff is not
- clear on which businesses maintain garbage dumpsters at this location.

- 28 Storm water regulations now require that garbage dumpsters have rain protection, in
- 29 essence, roofs. Any major changes to the garbage dumpsters should consider the
- need for storm water protection and compliance.
- 31 There is very limited space in this location for garbage haulers to maneuver and
- 32 pickup the dumpsters. Parking in this public lot is also at a premium. Any loss of
- parking stalls will have a direct impact on local businesses.
- 34 **DISCUSSION**: The use of public property for this private use without authority or
- payment and the unsightly condition of the area are issues which are overdue for
- 36 attention. The condition raises some complicated issues understandably associated
- with the long-term use including practical refuse needs of commercial businesses,
- 38 aesthetic concerns, environmental issues, compensation and liability issues,
- 39 appropriate use of public property, etc. These are not issues which can reasonably
- 40 be resolved in short order and will take some leadership and effort to satisfactorily
- 41 address.
- 42 As the Council knows, the Urban Design Plan suggests that the River frontage in the
- Downtown area be improved to provide enhancement of the River and pedestrian
- 44 access along the publically owned banks. The Plan also suggests an enhancement
- 45 of the Fire Station parking lot to enhance its general aesthetic appearance
- 46 (landscaping, lighting, furniture, pedestrian facilities, etc.). This level of improvement
- 47 is not presently budgeted and is not anticipated to occur in the immediate future.
- 48 Still, with the newly renovated Fire Station being completed at the end of this year,
- 49 there is an opportunity to improve the physical appearance of this much visited
- 50 public area.
- 51 Staff suggests that the long-term planning for the improvement of the Fire Station
- 52 parking lot and the River frontage improvements include planning for the removal of
- the private debris bins and for some limited (and attractively designed/screened)
- 54 public garbage collection facility. Again, it should be noted that this effort is not
- anticipated to begin in the near future. In the meantime and in the immediate future,
- staff recommends that Council request that the Chamber of Commerce assist to
- 57 lead and coordinate an effort to examine potential solutions for this existing garbage
- 58 dumpster problem. The group should include the Chamber, a representative of the
- 59 businesses having dumpsters in this location, and City staff. Given the budget
- 60 constraints, recommended solutions should not place any new demands on City
- staff or require City funding. Additionally, consideration should be given to direct
- that the existing dumpsters be promptly removed or encroachment permits obtained
- 63 for short-term authorization while the larger issue is examined and an interim
- 64 solution can be developed (issues to be addressed would include leases of the
- 65 public space, maintenance standards and responsibilities, environmental compliance
- improvements, aesthetic improvements and maintenance, etc.).
- 67 FISCAL IMPACT: Staff time to participate in a working group coordinated by the
- 68 Chamber.
