<u>ISSUE</u>:

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Presentation by Larry Florin, Napa County Community & Intergovernmental Affairs Manager, regarding the County's homelessness and farmworker housing services.

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## **RECOMMENDATION:**

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Receive presentation, discuss and provide direction as appropriate.

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## BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION:

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Napa County staff has requested to come before the City Council to provide an overview of various services provided to Napa Valley cities. Provided below is an overview of such services in which the County is requesting that the City of Calistoga provide annual funding support.

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18 19 <u>Farmworker Housing Services</u>: The Napa County Housing Authority owns and operates three farmworker housing centers in Napa County (the River Ranch Center on Silverado Trail near St. Helena, the Calistoga Center on North St. Helena Highway, and the Mondavi Center on Silverado Trail near Yountville). The Napa County Housing Authority budget to operate these centers is approximately \$1.2 million.

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The operations of the centers is funded through three primary sources: direct rent (\$12 per person per night) received by the farmworker tenants, proceeds from the special property tax (\$10 per acre) imposed on vineyard property in Napa County (CSA#4), and

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revenue generated at the centers related to phone and laundry facility use. In addition to the CSA#4 contribution, the County has received two grants from Auction Napa Valley for \$100,000 each. The County contributes \$190,000 annually to administer the program and had continually tapped the Affordable Housing Fund to fund repairs and shortfalls in the budget.

In September 2009, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2009-083 authorizing a budget adjustment and execution of a funding agreement with the Housing Authority in order to provide \$10,000 to support the Fiscal Year 2008/2009 Napa Valley Farmworker's Housing Centers operating budget. The purpose for this funding agreement was to share in the cost of covering a \$100,000 budget shortfall for fiscal year 2008-2009. With City support of this funding, the Council requested that the County seek alternative sources for financial support for future years.

At this time, the County is requesting that the City of Calistoga provide additional annual funding support in the amount of \$10,000 for this program (for the upcoming fiscal year). It should be noted that the City of American Canyon has already provided a \$10,000 payment for this program and the Town of Yountville and the City of St. Helena are currently considering their contribution to the program.

<u>Homelessness Housing Services</u>: Napa County Health and Human Services operates three homeless/emergency shelters, all based in the City of Napa vicinity: 1) Samaritan House; 2) the South Napa Shelter, and 3) a Winter Shelter. Samaritan is a family shelter, South Napa is for individuals, and the Winter Shelter is for the difficult to serve individuals from November-April.

 In addition, Health and Human Services operates the Hope Center, a day time, Monday-Friday drop in center in downtown Napa. The Hope Center is located in downtown Napa at the Methodist Church and is open Monday – Friday, 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. The Hope Center's main mission is outreach to the "hard to serve" homeless, i.e. the truly down and out, including drug and alcohol abusers who have a hard time abiding by any rules. The Hope Center provides washers, dryers, showers access to resources, including South Napa and the Winter Shelter. The Hope Center is the axis of the shelter system; this is the facility where homeless services start and where during the day referrals are handled for individuals who need shelter or other basic services.

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The rough estimates of Up-Valley utilization of the shelter services are:

Calistoga does not have a highly visible homeless problem, although there are homeless people in town. Arguable, if County services were not available it is reasonable to assume we would have a more visible homeless presence.

The establishment of the Calistoga Family Center has provided both a venue for outreach and opportunity for the County Health and Human Services to have a presence in the community. Among its services, the County is able to provide occasional transportation for homeless individuals who would benefit from services at either the Hope Center or the South Napa Shelter, thereby relieving the Police Department from having to make any trips. The local interaction between the Human Services' counselor and members of the Police Department also improves the delivery of services.

During Fiscal Years 2008-2009 and 2009-2010, the City has funded this organization directly at \$5,805 per year. Prior to this, pass through funds were included in the contractual agreements with the City of Napa Housing Authority and the Napa Valley Housing Authority.

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Currently, the shelters are operating at a deficit, which is aggravated by lack of financial support from the State. Samaritan and South Napa Shelter are currently funded by an approximate 1/3 split between the City of Napa, Community Action of Napa Valley (CANV) and Napa County. The Hope Center until now has been totally funded by CANV, however CANV's main funding source from HUD is over. The following table shows the current costs of the Hope Center and the Shelters along with current sources of funding for FY 2009-2010:

Consequently, Jim Featherstone, Assistant Director Napa County Health and Human Services, has suggested a strategy where the County and Cities as a whole could fund this service and continue to benefit from the established shelter system.

Mr. Featherstone is proposing a funding formula for the Hope Center's annual budget as follows:

To facilitate Council discussion on this matter, staff has provided below a summary of other related contractual housing services funded by the City to date that are likely to continue in the future.

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City of Napa Housing Authority (HACN): The City of Calistoga has long received affordable housing assistance and services from the City of Napa Housing Authority [formerly the Napa Valley Housing Authority (NVHA)]. This organization has undergone considerable structural change in an effort to streamline its activities in a more logical and efficient manner. Over the years, the Housing Authority had received its staff support from the City of Napa's Housing Department and provided a variety of housing services to the member agencies throughout the County. The City of Napa reorganized its Housing Department in 2007, and continues to provide housing services to the agencies throughout the County through the Housing Authority of the City of Napa (HACN). The City of Calistoga has historically received affordable housing policy assistance, as well as direct services related to affordable housing contract monitoring, mortgage subrogation (for those homes in the affordable housing program), grant application assistance, and compliance work and affordable housing development proposal advice.

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The City's contractual agreements with HACN for Fiscal Years 08-09 and 09-10 has been limited only to monitoring activities of the fifty-one (51) existing affordable housing units located in Calistoga (e.g., data collection, evaluation and monitor activities) to insure compliance with the terms of the various agreements, and to perform the various other tasks necessary throughout the year regarding compliance reporting and monitoring. In addition, HACN continues to provide Section 8 Housing Services, which results in 25 participants from Calistoga. Other housing services provided by HACN includes income verification and loan document preparation resulting from the recently enacted Down Payment Assistance Program and any subordination requests associated with existing deed restricted for-sale affordable housing units. As previously reported to the Council, City staff simply does not have the time for these tasks, and the City of Napa staff has performed this service well over the many years. It should be noted that technical assistance with regards to input and advice regarding development proposals, grant funding opportunities and program evaluation, and any ongoing housing policy/program matters for the City of Calistoga continues to be provided by City staff with assistance from the City Attorney and other consultants, as determined necessary. The existing contractual agreement with HACN through June 2010 is set not to exceed \$30,000. It is anticipated that staff will be requesting Council action on an extension of these contract services in June. Please note that with adoption of the Housing Element Update, staff will be conducting a program evaluation of these monitoring efforts and providing a recommendation of whether or not to continue these services for a longer period of time.

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<u>Fair Housing Services</u>: Fair Housing of Napa Valley is a private 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation dedicated to promoting and developing fairness and equality of housing

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- 170 opportunity for all people. Their goal is to eliminate housing discrimination and ensure 171 equal housing opportunity through leadership, education, facilitation, outreach, training, advocacy, and enforcement. During Fiscal Years 2008-2009 and 2009-2010, the City 172 has funded this organization directly at \$3,230 per year. Prior to this, pass through 173 174 funds were included in the contractual agreements with the City of Napa Housing 175 Authority and the Napa Valley Housing Authority. Within the first quarter of FY 2009-176 2010 (July 1-September 30, 2009), 15 clients from the Calistoga were served by this 177 program out of 256 total clients.
- FISCAL IMPACT: Any future City commitment to continue contractual services are expected to come from the Affordable Housing Fund for housing professional services.
